Each year we try to promote the Library's <u>Summer</u>
Reading to forestall the loss of students' reading abilities by offering enjoyable programs that encourage reading with age-appropriate books that delight, entertain, and improve and engage youthful minds.

### But the need for students to read in the summer is quite simply this:

Summer reading not only forestalls losses in learning, but research confirmed by many demonstrates that **learning is improved with summer reading for the next year** by increasing cognitive abilities and improving memory retention and comprehension.

# Here are only a few of the disheartening facts that confront us. <u>A child who cannot read on grade level by 3rd grade is 13 times less likely to graduate.</u>

Since reading instruction after <u>3rd grade</u> is replaced by math, science, and other studies, children not reading at grade level are destined continually to fall behind in all subjects with little hope of catching up.

Dropouts can face chronic unemployment, public assistance, and economic marginalization. We all bear these nearly incurable consequences.

### How Books Have Made a Difference in My Life - Jacob Renzo

Books changed my life when they became an escape from reality. Real life was not always easy or pleasant for growing up; there were no knights, no dragons that had magical powers, no serene landscapes where battles were fought and won. Books were my friends, and the story lines kept my mind off problems at home. Living with my mom and her boyfriend in Tennessee was physically and verbally abusive to me so I was sent to live with my Dad in North Carolina. However, living with my Dad was not much better; there were drugs and verbal abuse there as well. In 2015 I came to South Carolina to live with my grandparents. I read now mainly for enjoyment and entertainment as well as for school assignments.

People use a lot of different processes or ways of thinking when choosing what types of books they want to read. I usually choose a book based on my personal interests and what I find interesting as well as entertaining. I love fiction; the first piece of fiction that I fell in love with was the Harry Potter series. I read this series during a time in my life where I dreamt about a place where I wanted to live like Hogwarts with knights, dragons, and magical powers that would one day rescue me.

Over the years as my personal life changed; so did my interests in reading material. My interests have expanded since Harry Potter, and currently one of my favorite genres is sports. Two of my favorite authors are Mike Lupica and Tim Green. These two sports authors' writing styles have the ability to capture my focus in that I can visually see myself in the specific moment of a particular story line. Two of my favorite books are *True Legend* by Mike Lupica and *Deep Zone* by Tim Green. In *True Legend*, Drew is an outstanding high school basketball player who will eventually reach the NBA. The main character in *Deep Zone* is Ty who is an exceptional wide receiver with impressive speed who has a brother, Thane, who plays in the NFL. Both of these books are sports adventures, but through the pages life's lessons are learned. There are several places in the stories where trust is pivotal for relying both on your own instincts and trusting family and adults in general. Choices and ethics are two of the main themes throughout the books.

Reading is not only relaxing, fun, adventurous, and magical, it also allows you to experience things and places that you may never get to travel to or actually learn about. People, places, experiences come alive as you read, and I forget about the remains of a boring day or the frustrations that I have encountered on a particular day. Additionally, reading has helped me to develop my imagination and creativity, and it has improved my vocabulary and my abilities in class discussions.

Reading is an escape without physically going anywhere; it's stimulating as well as entertaining. You can experience feelings and emotions in lives you will probably never actually be in. Books are engaging because when you read it's all in your head, but it feels so much more real because you are an active partner.

Books give you the opportunity to know some of the great minds of the past and present and have the power to change your life if you let them. Allow books to influence you; open your mind and expand your horizons just by reading.

My career path is elementary education, so this will definitely give me a platform to share with my students the importance of education and the love of reading. Books have helped get me through some of the darkest times of my life and for that I will be a lifelong reader.

I appreciate the opportunity of writing this essay and hope it conveys how much reading has made an impact on my life as well as my character.
